



Maausk

maa (Estonian)- land, country, nation, ground, soil, lot, rural, terra, distance, native, or earth

usk (Estonian)- faith, belief, credence, religion, persuasion, or trust



Maausk

... is perceived to have been part of a continuum of ancient pre-Christian folk beliefs and traditions

... is a worldview which consists of a traditional lifestyle and a distinct culture and language that do not exist anywhere else

... is personal, and not one maausk is the same



Shrines

... connect with spirits and ancestors (forest, trees, stones, groves, springs, hills)

recognising historical sacred places
practicing traditional folk beliefs
connecting with nature

How can architecture enable a place in Tallinn to connect with nature on the principles of Maausk?

































































- Ridge detail in Estonian tradition
- Ventilated thatched roof, but mimicked on the inside





- Limestone wall as rain splash protection and continues outline of the building
- Crawling space for installations





