






Participation ladder. (source: Arnstein, 1969)















Simple representation of citizen participation in the average Dutch energy transition project. (own image)




EXPERIENCES WITH PARTICIPATION FATIGUE

Perceived experience with participation fatigue









"It's hard to get a conversation with the municipality about developments and when you do, it often turns out that the municipality and citizens speak different languages." — Anonymous, 2022

2. Participation fatigue due to lack of results or slow progress in the process 25.8%

"realization [of a project] takes a lot of time. The Government, Notary, Stedin [grid operator] and Certiq [organization that certifies electricity and heat generated from sustainable sources], are difficult to work with to get something really working, especially these last two. Working with the new regulation of the government will also be very difficult in the coming years." — Anonymous, 2022

"I still find it interesting and relevant, but I always have trouble doing the same thing for very long. As soon as routine creeps in somewhere I want to do something different." – Anonymous, 2022











3. Participation fatigue due to the intensity of the participation 14.6%

"By having been intensively active in our neighborhood initiative for a few years now (and by also taking on more work than I first intended), I sometimes find that I am quite busy participating. It is now almost as important as my real job." – Anonymous, 2022

"Our "work" takes a lot of time and energy, pioneering. We are not received enthusiastically by everyone. Always having to apply for subsidies etc."—Anonymous, 2022











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4. Participation fatigue due to lack of enthusiasm of fellow citizens or organizations/businesses **9.0%**"There is a huge lack of knowledge and the right attitude among the public, we are not going to fix that. [...] People are busy with their mortgages and hobbies, travelling, etc. The fact that people in India live at 10 degrees C or less in houses without central heating, does not occur to them. Seriously sacrificing luxury to save the earth is not something we are taught in school or work."—Anonymous, 2022











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- 4. Participation fatigue due to lack of enthusiasm of fellow citizens or organizations/businesses "There is a huge lack of knowledge and the right attitude among the public, we are not going to fix that. [...] People are busy with their mortgages and hobbies, travelling, etc. The fact that people in India live at 10 degrees C or less in houses without central heating, does not occur to them. - 5. Participation fatigue due to lack of serious uptake of participants' input 7.8%

"Real participation did not exist; decisions had already been made. The project was started just to be able to paint a nice picture for press releases. A real political game." — Anonymous, 2022

"This concerned the RES. The municipality keeps talking about the importance of citizen participation and was proud to involve citizens. I didn't think involvement in step 5 (out of 7) was a good example and felt like an "excuus-Truus" [basically a female token in Dutch], something to tick off a box with."—Anonymous, 2022












PARTICIPATION FATIGUE - EFFECTS

Categorization of the effects of participation fatigue (All cases)
























































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- Framework reflects reality

• TPB: indicator of possible preventative measures that are needed in order to evade the occurrence of participation fatigue (for example: sending out a survey in which residents can indicate how they would like to participate in the energy transition project, the process can then be designed according to these answers and this will increase the perceived behavioral control of future participants)



Regarding the municipality





 Municipality should be willing to enter an open dialogue with citizens and citizen initiatives sends a message that citizen initiatives are an added value to the municipality, increasing morale and a sense of autonomy



- Appointing a fixed point of contact within the municipality, for citizens and citizen initiatives
- More clarity on rules and regulations
- Professional guidance (if possible)





SQ4 - PRACTICAL IMPLICATIONS



Regarding the municipality

- Participation for the sake of participation should absolutely be avoided municipalities should only enter the participation process with a clear goal and process in mind

- Appointing a fixed point of contact within the municipality, for citizens and citizen initiatives

Adapting the process

- Create clarity and purpose in the participation process (long-term AND short term)
- Celebration of achievements and milestones
- More fun, less formality



SQ4 - PRACTICAL IMPLICATIONS



Reaching the public, lessening the burden

- Raising awareness municipalities and citizen groups should work together in order to raise awareness about energy transition and increase the visibility of existing initiatives/projects.
- Promoting participation: make it personal, make it fun
- Reaching underrepresented groups (women, younger people, etc)










Frequency of the participation









RECOMMENDATIONS

- Testing the participation toolkit Longitudonal study in which possible solutions are implemented in the participation process. Solutions could then be assessed on how well they prevent the participation fatigue/ contribute to the participation process
- Future research could shed more light on the difference between participation fatigue experienced by citizens participating through municipal processes, and those participating through citizen initiatives.
